Fred Barker House-1900. 518 East.

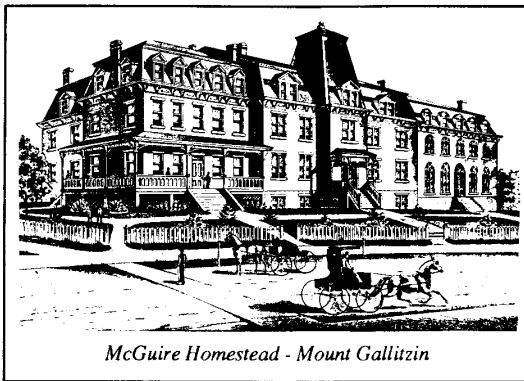
H. A. Thompkins House-1898. 403 East.

Baptist Church-1905 (39) This old congregation traces its origins to the Beulah church founded in 1797 by Morgan John Rhys.



James McGuire Homestead-1858 and Mount Gallitzin Academy-1888 (40). The home of James McGuire, sometime sheriff of Cambria County and descendant of its first Catholic settler, was acquired by the Sisters of St. Joseph and expanded as an academy for the education of orphaned boys for several decades. It is now an apartment house.

Belmont-1842 605 West. This federal house once had rambling wood wings which filled the whole block. It sat alone on its hill with an unobstructed view of the town and countryside, as Belmont, a nationally-known mountain resort hotel. In the 1950's it was restored to its original size and role as a private home.

M. D. Kittell House-1910 521 West. Distinguished by its terra cotta roof and wrap-around porch, this fine house was built by banker and attorney M. D. Kittell and has served as headquarters of the United Mine Workers, District 2, since 1949.
